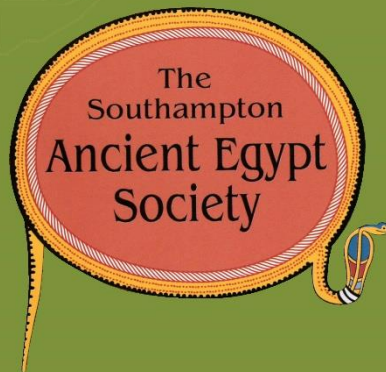

**Saturday 17 September: Hilary Wilson**

**'Who was who at the court of Tutankhamun'**

After the Amarna period, Egypt required a firm hand. A ten year old boy required the support of more experienced advisors. This talk shows us who they were.

**Saturday 15 October 2022: Mark Lehner**

**Heit el-Ghurab and Wadi el-Jarf: landscape and waterscape at Giza when the pyramids were built**

Looking at insights from comparisons between the Heit el-Ghurab 4<sup>th</sup> Dynasty settlement at Giza with the port of Khufu at the Sorbonne Wadi el-Jarf site and the papyri they found there.

**Saturday 19 November 2022: Ken Griffin**

**Karnak: the most sacred of places**

Karnak was built and expanded for over 2,000 years, the religious capital of Egypt for much of that time. Many pharaohs are memorialised here. The history and development of the site will be covered in this talk.

**Dewatering systems for wastewater and rain in Ancient Egypt**

What were the dewatering systems for rain and used water in pharaonic times? The oldest Egyptian installation dates to 3100 BC. The Egyptians used techniques still recognisable today.

**Nefertiti's face: investigating Egypt's most famous queen.**

Sculptured more than 3,000 years ago, Nefertiti's bust both attracts us and sparks our imagination. Professor Tyldesley explores its creation and modern context.

**The Amarna Letters**

The Amarna letters, cuneiform tablets excavated in Egypt in the 19<sup>th</sup> century, have remarkable content whose importance continues to become apparent.

**An Ancient Egyptian Michaelangelo? Senenmut and his times**

Senenmut is the most famous non-royal in Ancient Egypt. His creativity and relationship with the female pharaoh Hatshepsut are explored.

**Preparing for the afterlife in Deir-el-Medina**

The village of the workmen who built the royal tombs offers a wealth of detail about daily life in Ancient Egypt, including their preparation for the afterlife.

**Saturday 20 May 2023: Chris Elliott**

**The elderly lady's elephant: the history of Cleopatra's needle.**

A history of the famous monument on London's embankment, covering more than 3,300 years of history.

**Saturday 17 June 2023: Luigi Prada**

**Freudian dreams along the Nile: sex and dream interpretation in Ancient Egypt.**

Dream interpretation was a major divinatory art in Ancient Egypt. Papyrus manuscripts survive that cover dream interpretation. This talk explores what the priests made of erotic dreams.
